



- Grow Your Own Educator National Network:
 Convenes a professional learning community that supports Grow Your Own programs across the country.
- Toolkit for Grow Your Own Programs:
 Developed a comprehensive toolkit to support the development of Grow Your Own program.
- 50 State Scan: Conducted a 50-state scan to assess the landscape of policies and programs that support Grow Your Own initiatives.
- Department of Labor-funded Intermediary for K12 Apprenticeship: Focuses on developing pathways for paraeducators and other nontraditional candidates to enter the workforce.

Early Childhood Workforce Specialist

- In 2023, Minnesota lawmakers allocated over \$300 million towards early childhood initiatives, including:
 - Grow Your Own ECE
 - Empower to Educate Program to recruit and retain early educators
 - The creation of a new state agency, the Department of Children, Youth, and Families.
- **TEACH Apprenticeships** are scheduled to begin in 2024.
- Dual Enrollment Training initiatives are in place to support high school pathways to becoming early educators


- Actively works with 5 local Boston-based ECE programs (the Neighborhood) to model a "district," and innovate solutions based on provider-identified needs, including: operations management, family navigation, mental health support, teaching and learning, and workforce pathways.
- Began Registered Apprenticeship program in 2023 with CDA track for new teachers, and Director track for aspiring leaders in the field.
- Cohort 2 launched in 2024 and currently playing role of Ambassador for ECE Registered Apprenticeship expansion in MA

- Two-generation programming and wraparound supports.
- Provides comprehensive training programs for early educators, focusing on bilingual education and cultural competence.
- Through a robust mentorship program,
 Charlotte Bilingual School supports early

 teaching practices in a bilingual setting.
